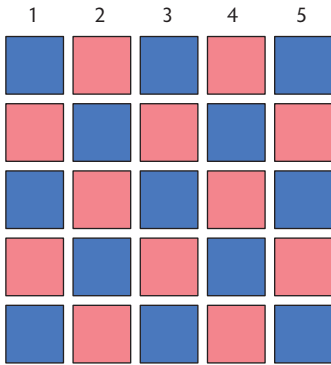


Wonderful Webbing

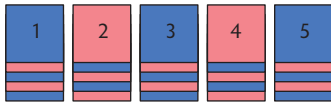
Use for assembling quilt tops and even for blocks

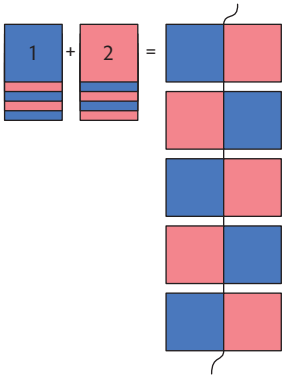
1. Lay out your blocks in rows and columns.



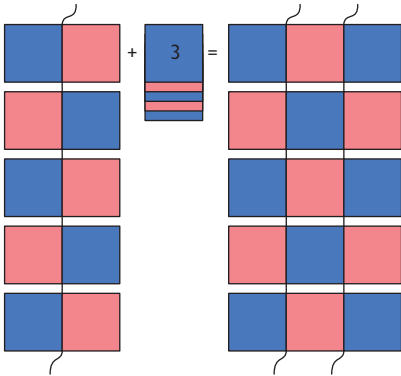
2. Arrange columns of blocks with top-row blocks on top. Or, you know, how you like to do it.



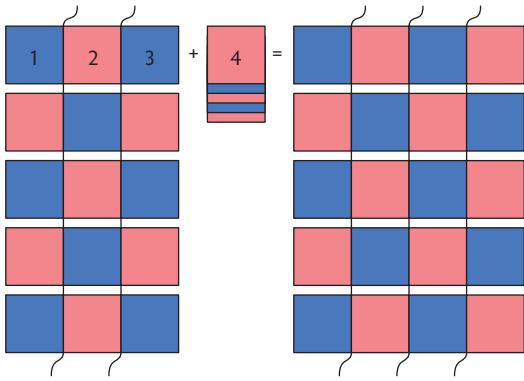
3. Chain-piece blocks from top to bottom starting with columns 1 and 2. Don't break any of the chain-piecing threads.



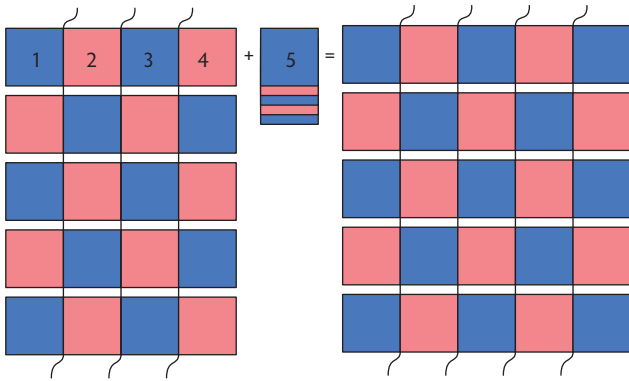
4. Don't press the seams yet. Chain-piece blocks from column 3 to the blocks of column 2. Don't break any of the chain-piecing threads.



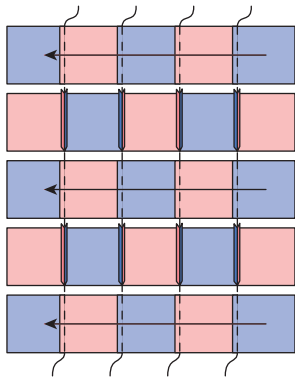
1. Don't press the seams yet. Chain-piece blocks from column 4 to the blocks of column 3. Don't break any of the chain-piecing threads.



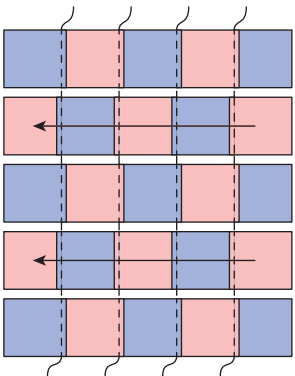
2. Don't press the seams yet. Chain-piece blocks from column 5 to the blocks of column 4. Don't break any of the chain-piecing threads.



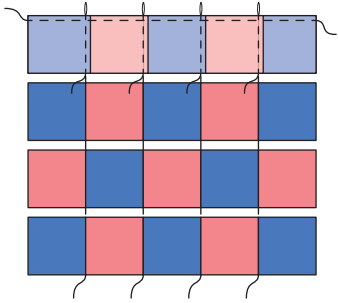
3. Turn the work face down. Press the odd-row seams in the in the same direction.



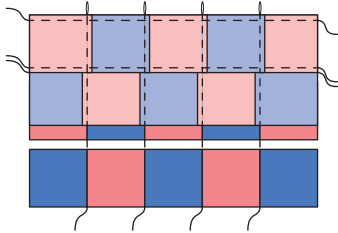
4. Rotate the work 180 degrees. Press the even-row seams in the opposite direction from the odd-row seams. Or, you know, press it how you like to press it.



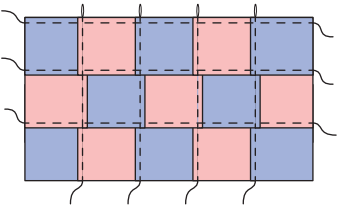
1. Turn the work face up. Fold over the first row, RST. The unbroken chain-piecing threads are very helpful aligning the rows for piecing. Clip (or pin) at seams; sew the rows together.



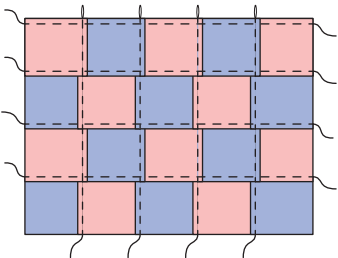
2. Repeat for second row.



3. Repeat for third row.



4. Repeat for final row.



5. Press seam allowances in the same direction (or whatever makes sense to you). You're done!
